Biographical Sketch: Flight Officer George D McKiel flew with the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) until his aircraft was shot down while bombing Schweinfurt on 24 February 1944. He was taken as a Prisoner of War (POW) and transferred to Stalag Luft III. McKiel was also involved with the infamous "Great Escape," in which 50 Air Force Officers were executed by the Gestapo.

Language: textual material in the fond is in English.

Scope and Content: The collection contains letters relating to his capture and correspondence with the crew's families.
